Tourist Information

Berlin is a unique city. You can't just visit Berlin—you have to experience it. Despite its long and often turbulent history, it always managed to reinvent itself—which is exactly what it is doing right now: the reunified Berlin has just experienced ten years of tremendous change and is today reorganising itself as the buzzing political and cultural centre of the new "Berlin Republic". Nowhere in Germany will you find so many artists, musicians, writers and actors living in one place as here. Berlin has more than 100 public and private theatres, countless cinemas, and plays host to film festivals. There are also three opera houses, the Berliner Philharmonie, famous museums, more than 200 galleries, three universities, and academies for acting, photography, design and fashion.

The enormous size of the city and its high diversity make it difficult to define any "must-see's" or a standard set of places to visit and things to do while you are in the city—especially when time is limited. This document shall give you some orientation and stimulation for your time in Berlin. If you are interested in the fascinating and unique history of this city, we recommend to take part in the English-language guided walking tour on Sunday, Dec. 9 (no prepayment required).

Public Transport

Berlin has an extremely well-developed public transport system. Berlin's S-Bahn (metropolitan train) and U-Bahn (subway), as well as tram and bus services are extensive, frequent, fast and reliable. They are all operated by the same transport authority, the BVG, and are all connected on the same three-zone tariff system.

A DM 4.20 ticket allows travel for two hours on all forms of transport in two adjacent zones, which covers most of the eastern and western centres of Berlin. For DM 12.00 you can purchase a day ticket (Tageskarte) for the inner city zones (A and B) which is valid until 3:00 am. There are ticket machines at every station but you can also purchase tickets at the central offices of the BVG at Bahnhof Zoologischer Garten (central "Zoo" station) or Bahnhof Friedrichstraße. Usually, you have to make a ticket valid by stamping it at the station or bus stop you want to begin your trip. In general, the direction of travel is indicated by the last stop on the line.

One secret tip for experts is the bus no. 100, locally known as the "sightseeing line". It is a regular bus line, which traverses almost the whole centre of Berlin while passing most of the important sights, including the Brandenburg Gate, the famous boulevard Unter den Linden and Alexanderplatz.

Museums

Berlin's museums exhibit some of the world's most beautiful art treasures. The so-called Museum Island plays home to the famous Pergamon Alter, the Ishtar Gate from Babylon, and, in the Egyptian Museum in the western part of Berlin, the bust of the beautiful queen Nefertiti. In many cases, the Cold War division led to a duplication of museums and galleries, to the effect that in the 1960s and 1970s, all museums in East-Berlin were not accessible to West-Berliners who then set about building their own museums, such as the Culture Forum at Potsdamer Platz. The following is a list of a few of the most well known museums:

Pergamon Museum (archaeological museum), Museum Island, Tu-Sun 10-6, U/S-Bahn Friedrichstraße.

Altes Museum (antiquities), Museum Island/Lustgarten, Tu-Sun 10-6, Bus 100.

Alte Nationalgalerie (19th century art), Museum Island/Lustgarten, Tu-Sun 10-6, Bus 100, famous selection of 19th century artists.

Gemäldegalerie (old masters), Matthäikirchplatz, Tu-Fri 10-6, Sat-Sun 11-6, U/S-Bahn Potsdamer Platz or Bus 129.

Neue Nationalgalerie (20th Century art incl. former East German artists), Potsdamer Straße 50, Tu-Fri 10-6, Sat-Sun 11-6, U/S-Bahn Potsdamer Platz or Bus 129.

Hamburger Bahnhof (contemporary art), Invalidenstraße 50-51, Tu-Fri 10-6, Sat-Sun 11-6, S-Bahn Lehrter Bahnhof

Berggruen Collection (Picasso and his time), Schloßstraße 1—opposite the Charlottenburg Palace, Tu-Fri 10-6, Sat-Sun 11-6, Bus 145.

Egyptian Museum, Schloßstraße 70—opposite the Charlottenburg Palace, Tu-Fri 10-6, Sat-Sun 11-6, Bus 145.

Allied Museum, Clayallee 135, Thu-Tu 10-6, U-Bahn Oskar-Helene-Heim (U1), free entry. Documents the presence of the Western Allies, 1945-94, incl. the Berlin Airlift.

Bauhaus Archiv, Klingelhöferstraße 14, Wed-Mon 10-5, Bus 100 or 129

Charlottenburg Palace, Luisenplatz. Originally built as Queen Sophie Charlotte's summer palace in the 1690s. Bus 145. Featuring the Knobelsdorff wing built in the 18th century, the Gallery of the Romantics, Tu-Fri 10-6, Sat-Sun 11-6, and the wonderful gardens—free, and open till dark.

Checkpoint Charlie Museum (Haus am Checkpoint Charlie), Friedrichstraße 44, daily 9am-10pm, DM8, U-Bahn Kochstraße

Jewish Museum (Jüdisches Museum), Lindenstraße15, U-Bahn Kochstraße Daniel Libeskind's extraordinary new building. Tours of the building in English at 1.30 and 3pm daily (call 259 933).

Topography of Terror (museum and monument area at the sites of the head-quarters of the former Gestapo, the Nazi secret police), Niederkirchnerstraße, no charge, 10-till dark, daily.

Reichstag (Deutscher Bundestag), Platz der Republik 1, free entry to the roof, daily 8am-midnight (last admission 10pm), S-Bahn Unter den Linden, Bus 100.

Theaters and Operas

Berlin has three opera houses and a number of concert houses. There is also a small number of English-language theatre companies and varieté theatres in the city. You will find some web links at the end of this document.

The Team of "Original Berlin Walks" offers a unique sightseeing tour in English. The Discover Berlin Walk will introduce you to Berlin's complex, sometimes tragic past and its exciting present! Find out how a swamp by the Spree river was transformed into the capital of the Kaisers, or where Albert Einstein
